Lockdown Drill

It is a requirement of all schools in New Zealand to hold a Lockdown Drill annually. Lockdown is a term used to describe securing a building or site by controlling the people entering and leaving it. A school would usually trigger a lockdown for significant threats or hazards that impact on the health, safety, or security of people in the school eg. swarm of bees, aggressive dog on site, intruder present. This term we are holding our inside and outside lockdown drill. This will mean our students will practice what to do in their classrooms if there is a lockdown and what to do in the playground if there is a lockdown. This will be covered with the students prior to the drills. The drills are scheduled for later in the term. We will inform you of the dates closer to the time. Lockdown drills can be upsetting for some students which is why we are giving plenty of notice so you can support your child with this.

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<u>Ngunguru School - Earth Ed</u>

Yesterday, the tamariki of Moana were invited to be kaitiaki of the sandspit outside the school. Northland Regional Council came to teach us about the pest plants in the dunes and the awesome native plants that support the dune ecosystems.

We learnt to identify ice plants which have pretty flowers but outcompete the native plants. The enthusiastic tamariki filled a whole trailer of ice plants.

We also planted spinifex and pīngao grass, these are two native plants that help hold the dunes together. We want strong dunes to create habitats for our special costal birds.

The students also learnt the importance of staying on the paths to stop the dunes eroding. It was an awesome day and I am so proud of all the enthusiastic environmentalists who got stuck in planting and weeding.





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
